







A form of severe child abuse that includes a child/youth under the age of 18 performing a sex act in exchange for money or something of value, regardless of whether there is any force, fraud, or intimidation involved.

Traffickers and buyers can be any gender, nationality or age. This includes:



bosses



strangers



romantic partners



friends or peers



family members





Watch for warning signs that a youth may be in an exploitative and/or abusive situation.

The warning signs may include if the youth:



Packs a backpack with clothes, or does not return at night



Is absent from school and has no explanation for the absences



Leaves and arrives home at unusual hours



Shares they have been threatened by someone with deportation or harm



Is unaware of the current date. location, or time



Has multiple phones

Continued from previous page... The warning signs may include if the youth:



Is extremely tired, anxious, aggressive, or defensive



Has increased their drug or alcohol use or started using drugs and alcohol



Brings a lot of money or expensive gifts home



Has attempted to self-harm or commit suicide



Has an age-inappropriate romantic partner



Has suddenly started hanging out with a new group of peers who seem to be a bad influence





Has bruising or burns on their body



Does not possess their passport, money, or phone because someone is withholding them.



Wears clothing and has behaviors that are highly sexualized



Has attempted to run away or leave home



Has been treated for frequent sexually transmitted infections



Appears to be monitored or controlled and is not able to speak for oneself or share information.



What do I do if I notice these warning signs?



Talk to the youth and your caseworker.



If the youth goes missing, file a report with local law enforcement and the **National Center for Missing &** Exploited Children at 1-800-843-5678.



Contact the youth's **school staff**. Ask how you can support the youth.



Call **Child Protective Services**

or 911 to report someone you know is abusing or exploiting a child.



Call the **Office of Refugee** Resettlement (ORR) National Call Center at 1-800-203-7001 for support if you do not have a caseworker.
